typical scene in the capacious kitchen of Lydia and Richard Bell's Kensington home might involve the whole family sat around the large island enjoying a homemade meal or it may reveal the creative and fun side to its owners.

On first viewing, the couple were drawn to this original 1950s brick house, now rendered white, because it was wider than normal and offered lots of potential for them to create a family space with plenty of light and room to entertain. They moved in at the end of March with their three children Tom, nine, Jake,

seven, and Maya, five, and began organising architectural work on the house and garden before finding Sola Kitchens, through very positive word of mouth, to install their new kitchen. With a brief for a contemporary classic kitchen with modern appliances and plenty of work surface and storage, Managing Director Sofia Bune, soon set to work on translating this wish list into a practical reality.

At the start of the project it was easy to see how everything would come together, Lydia explains, 'Sofia created digital images so we could visualise the look. This was very helpful as it was very hard to imagine the potential of the space due to basement construction.' Lydia and Richard discussed several different layouts with Sofia before ending up with the current one which they're really pleased with. The first option was a U-shaped kitchen with an island but they agreed that it was a bit too traditional for them As she explains, 'A big consideration was the scating at the end of the island, and to make sure it could seat at least six people.' The couple both enjoy cooking and baking and with all this extra scating it makes entertaining and family mealtimes easy.

When it came to fitting the furniture, Sofia describes, 'There were a few challenges, particularly as there were two vertical pillars towards the end of the kitchen, one through the dresser and another through one of the tall units. We had to plan very carefully to make sure we could build around and hide them.' Combining the fitted cabinets with a freestanding island and a natural colour palette of soft, cool blue and shades of green creates a harmonious and spacious feel that links with the outdoors and makes the most of the pleasant garden views.

All in all, the couple are really thrilled with the result and have since enjoyed shopping in the Harrods kitchen department for additional accessories and Porta Romana for freestanding lamps. Describing the pleasure she takes from her new kitchen, Lydia reveals, 'We spend a lot of time as a family in the kitchen whether it's eating, cooking, doing homework or drawing. 
SOFIA BUNE MANAGING DIRECTOR, SOLA KITCHENS

Where did you begin with the kitchen design? We discussed several different layouts before ending up with the

current design. The first option was a U-shaped kitchen with an island, but the clients thought that was a bit too traditional and also took too much of the light from the roof light at the end of the room (above the blackboard).

How did you choose the materials?

The clients wanted traditional, solid wood kitchen units with a mix of stone and wood worktops. in the cabinets and matched it with a white stained solid oak worktop for part of the kitchen island. The carcasses are solid blockwood and all drawers and



The island, from the Sola Kitchens Newport range, is completely freestanding and could in theory be moved. However, with the large honed marble effect Silestone and white stained solid oak slab worktop it is very heavy, so it would be difficult in practice. We also have electricity connecting to the island so you would have to be careful when moving it. The idea behind the We used white stained oak interior island was to make it large but not feel too heavy. So, we lifted the whole island up on a leg system so that there's plenty of air underneath. We also put LED lights under the island for practical inserts are white stained solid oak. reasons and to make it feel lighter.

WORK SURFACES




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
